In the past the President has reviewed books that may be of interest to members. The following list is a selection of a few of the books that have been published during "lockdown" and immediately before.

Michael Aminoff: Victor Horsley: The world's first neurosurgeon and his conscience. Cambridge University Press, 2022. (An expensive but worthwhile biography of Horsley. Horsley will be the

subject of **David Abernethy's lecture on Thursday 2 March.** David has unearthed information about Horsley that is not dealt with in this biography).

Colin Averill and Geoffrey Rice: *The Life of Leslie Averill MD. First into Le Quesnoy. Battles, babies and boardrooms*. Dobincourt Press, 2018.

**Brian Barraclough:** A Partly Anglicised Kiwi. A psychiatrist remembers 2020. (Most members will know Brian Barraclough. He has written a memoir about parts of his life including his experiences at Otago Medical School, as a junior doctor in Christchurch and his training as a psychiatrist at the Maudsley Hospital in London. A candid, insightful and interesting memoir which I strongly recommend.)

Earle Brown and Michael Klaassen: *Perfection. The life and times of Sir William Manchester*. Mary Egan Publishing, 2021. (A biography of well-known plastic surgeon, Sir William Manchester. Earle Brown and Mike Klaassen have given lectures at our meetings in the past.)

Lindsey Fitzharris: *The Facemaker: one surgeon's battle to mend the disfigured soldiers of World War I*. Allen Lane, 2022. (The surgeon is Sir Harold Gillies. On sale in many bookstores at present).

Lone Frank: *The Pleasure Shock. The rise of deep brain stimulation and its forgotten inventor*. Dutton, 2018. {Deep brain stimulation is now widely used for the treatment of a variety of neurological disorders, especially Parkinson's disease. This book describes how an American neuropsychiatrist, Dr Robert Heath, invented DBS for an entirely different and controversial reason. I recommend this book).

Cherry Lewis: *The Enlightened Mr Parkinson. The pioneering life of a forgotten English surgeon* Icon Books, 2017 (An excellent biography of James Parkinson, whose name will forever be associated with Parkinson's disease. He also was the first person to describe appendicitis).

Simon Shorvon and Alastair Compston: *Queen Square. A history of the National Hospital and its Institute of Neurology*. Cambridge University Press, 2019. (A comprehensive and entertaining history of the National Hospital, Queen Square).
